**Labor Day Celebration Planned  
Which Will Be the Biggest  
Ever Held Here**

**Fairgrounds Will Be Scene of Dem-  
onstration and There Will Be  
Many Visitors**

The committee appointed by the central labor union to make arrangements for the observance of National labor day, September 1, met in Carpenters' hall Saturday night and outlined a general program, but none of the details have yet been arranged.

The committee has secured permission from the Gibson county fair association to have the scene of the labor demonstration at the fairgrounds, the date being the first day of the fair and Elks' vaudeville. All the labor unions in the city and others in neighboring towns and cities will take part in the celebration. Parades will likely be given in the morning and evening of that day, and there will be speaking and other exercises.

Sub-committees were appointed Saturday night to arrange more in detail for the demonstration. The committee will meet again Thursday night at which time the full arrangements will be perfected. Announcement of the exercises will be made through the papers in due time.

**A Monster Organization  
Now Being Per-  
fected.**

**All the Leading Zinc Mines of  
Country to Be Included in the  
Proposed Combination.**

**A New Element and Large Capital  
the Industrial World to Con-  
trol the Market.**

St. Louis, Aug. 11.—The Lead Zinc News today says: What will be the greatest lead combination in the country is now nearing its completion. While its promoters are not ordinarily reticent, it is definitely known that the scope of the merger will include most of the large lead plants east of the Mississippi river, the principal pipe and sheet lead plants, a number of shot towers and companies manufacturing products which lead forms one of the chief components.

Included in the merger will be the Union Lead and Oil company, which was organized last year by the Ryan Whitney coterie of capitalists with a capital of \$10,000,000 and which controls the Bailey process of manufacturing white lead. Overtures were made to induce the National Lead company to join the merger are said to be favorably looked upon by a portion of the directorate.

Behind the merger are the Lead Whitney and American Smelting Refining company interests. Operations have been secured on a number of roasting plants of the country, notably the Chadwick company of Boston and the Raymond company of Chicago.
