### Programs Entertain

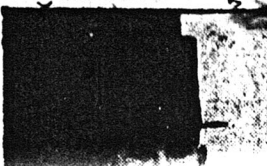

## TWO ARE KILLED IN CRASH OF BUS AND AUTOMOBILES

**VINCENNES MAN AND BRIDGEPORT BOY VICTIMS OF HIGHWAY ACCIDENT NEAR VINCENNES THIS MORNING—SEVERAL INJURED**

VINCENNES, Ind., Aug. 26. (P)—Leo Henderson of Vincennes, and Landis Martin, 15, of Bridgeport, Ill., were killed and several other persons were injured in an accident involving a bus and two automobiles on State Road 12 near here today.

Henderson's car, in which young Martin was a passenger, was struck head-on by a bus owned by the Midland Trail Bus company of Vincennes, after the latter was alleged to have sideswiped an automobile driven by Frank Edwards, of Martinsville, Ind. Henderson was dead when picked up and the Martin boy died in the Good Samaritan hospital here a short time after the accident.

### Over Embankment

Henderson was driving the automobile which was struck head-on. Martin was riding with him. Both the bus and the automobile fell over an embankment and Henderson was dead when reached. Martin at first was believed to be fatally injured but hospital physicians held hope for his recovery.

The car which was sideswiped was driven by Frank Edwards, 25, of Martinsville. Lloyd Englewood, of Olney, Ill., driver of the bus, was cut and bruised.

### Treated in Hospital

The list of persons treated at the hospital, as announced by those in charge, included in addition to Martin, the following:

Mrs. Kenneth Nelson, Olney, Ill.; Miss Edith Bennett, Lawrenceville, Ill.; Mrs. Alice Smith, Olney, Ill., and Mr. and Mrs. John Slater, Olney, Ill. Lloyd Theriac, 23, Vincennes, who was riding with Edwards, had a bruised arm but did not go to the hospital. Neither did Edwards, whose face was cut. M. O. Stoner of Robinson, Ill.; F. J. Jones, Lawrenceville; Burt Dunning, Lawrenceburg, and Mrs. Frances Whittaker, address not given, were passengers on the bus and were shaken up but did not go to the hospital.

## AIR PATHFINDER HERE WEDNESDAY

**SCOUT TO VISIT PRINCETON MAKING ARRANGEMENTS TRADE TOUR**

The pathfinder plane of the 1 Aircraft Trade association is due here here Wednesday morning over the southern part of the state to work out a schedule for the fleet of planes which the association will send out from Indiana between September 16 and 20.

The pathfinder is scheduled to Princeton about 10:20 o'clock Wednesday morning but circumstances postpone slightly—the plane's pilot will be piloted by H. C. Fisher with Herbert O. Fisher, assistant director, as a passenger.

### Field Data Sought

The pathfinder is to get all kinds of data on the fields. For one thing, desired that the field be of ample size. 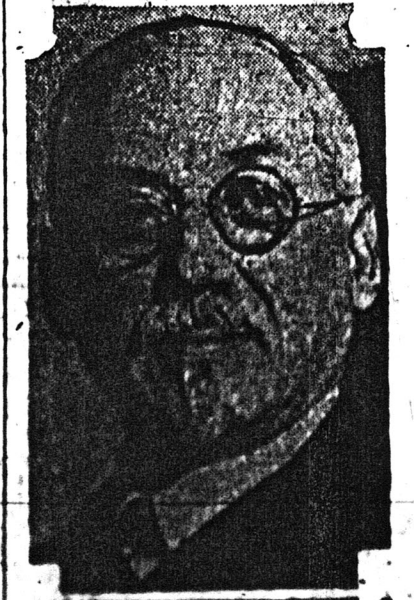
