## GUN SHOTS AND MUCH SCUFFLING

CREATED GREAT EXCITEMENT  
 LATE SATURDAY NIGHT  
 Youth Accused of Automobile Stealing Are Overtaken by Two Officers—Three Arrests Made

Four Evansville young men with a stolen automobile, a big Cadillac, and two young men in pursuit of them, created considerable excitement and gave the police a workout here about 11 o'clock Saturday night.

According to the information gained by the authorities, a big car belonging to the office of the Burroughs Adding Machine Co. in Evansville was stolen. Two employes of the company, M. W. Woodall and T. R. Barnes, young men of about 21, learned the auto was gone, immediately loaded into a Ford and were after it, without taking time to notify the Evansville police. They pursued the fleeing car closely, and when they arrived here found it in front of the Greek confectonery, and four young men, with whom they were said to be acquainted, inside. They waited till the four men—whose names are given as Louis Compton, Dr. Alvin Noweller, 19, and Louis Rogge, and Lincoln Forkins, about the same age and all of Evansville—came from the store and started to enter the car, when the two pursuers pulled revolvers and ordered the others to surrender.

The pursued ones flouted the gunholders that they would not shoot. Woodall then jumped and grabbed one of the men, Rogge, and while they were scuffling the others fled. Rogge, pursued by Barnes. To attract attention of police, he says, Woodall fired several shots in the air, and soon the policeman, Dr. Alvin Noweller, Dr. Lincoln George White, arrested and relieved Woodall and took the pursued in charge. A number had been arrested to the scene and with the police they searched the rear part of the car, in which direction it had been going, but none could be found.

## VICIOUS ATTACK

IS MADE BY TILDEN HUGHES ON VIRGIL WRIGHT  
 Father Uses Knife on Young Man He Finds With His Daughter Saturday Night

Virgil Wright, aged 17, was seriously cut Saturday night about 9 o'clock in an attack alleged to have been made by Tilden Hughes, about 45 years old, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Black at Oak and Gibson streets. Hughes is in jail awaiting arraignment.

According to the statements of witnesses, Mrs. Hazel Hughes, who lives with her mother and a sister, a couple of blocks east of the Black home in Oak street, was seated with Virgil Wright on the porch at the home of her sister, Mrs. Black, when her father, Tilden Hughes, came along the street stepped up to where they were seated, without warning pulled out his pocket knife and began slashing at the young man, who finally broke away and ran, an ugly cut in the back of his neck, a deep cut in the top of the head and a very bad cut in one arm. The father pursued, it is said, but did not overtake the dangerously wounded boy.

While doctors were treating the patient and police were searching for Hughes a short time after the attack, the latter walked up to Sheriff Flowers in a barber shop uptown and said: "I want to be locked up. I have just cut a man."

The condition of Wright, at first believed dangerous, was reported improving today and it is thought he will soon recover.

Hughes and his wife formerly lived in the R. M. A. Addition, but separated awhile back. He has been living there with a mother and the wife and two children, on Spruce in east Park street. It is said that four or five years ago Hughes shot and wounded his wife and was confined in the penitentiary, and it is understood he was at liberty under a parole when he died.

It is believed that he had been turned to Evansville by the police, and that he had been there for a day or two, before he was taken to see whether this be the case, whether they may have been secured in other automobile burgs, to watch the incoming train for the suspects.
