**FOUR LABOR DAY**

**TWO CELEBRATIONS ARE BEING  
 HELD IN GIBSON COUNTY**

**Big Parade at Ft. Branch This Morning**  
 With Addresses Following—Fran-  
 cisco Flag Raising

While Princeton is having no special  
 celebration of Labor Day, other than a  
 general suspension of industry and  
 business, there will be two celebrations  
 held in Gibson county, one at Ft.  
 Branch under auspices of the Miners'  
 Union and the registered men of Union  
 township, and the other at Francisco,  
 where there will be a flag raising on a  
 116-foot pole erected recently, with ded-  
 ication also of the Center township  
 service flag. The principal address will  
 be given by Hon. John W. Brady, of  
 Evansville. The Francisco exercises  
 will be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon.  
 There will be music by the Elks quar-  
 tette, of this city, and other features.

Ft. Branch has planned the biggest  
 celebration in southern Indiana for this  
 Labor Day. At 10 o'clock a big pa-  
 rade will form on Main street there  
 and march to Strain's grove, where the  
 exercises will be held. The Union town-  
 ship honor roll, carrying the names of  
 more than 100 men now in service, will  
 be dedicated, with addresses by Hon.  
 W. E. Stilwell, of Evansville, native of  
 Ft. Branch, and Hon. Arch M. Hall, of  
 Indianapolis. There will also be other  
 speakers. There will be drills by the  
 Princeton militia company and by the  
 Union township Liberty Guards. The  
 Ft. Branch band will furnish the music.

Proceeds from the sales of refresh-  
 ments will go toward buying uniforms  
 for the Union township Liberty Guards.  
 A number from here will attend the  
 celebrations at Ft. Branch or Francisco.
