CONDITION OF YATES CRITICAL

NEW YORK, Aug. 15. — (AP) — State
Senator Roy T. Yates, of Patterson N.
J., remained in a critical condition to-
day with a bullet wound in his abdo-
men, which police say, he sustained
during a drinking party in the apart-
ment of Miss Ruth Jayne here.

Several blood transfusions were
made during the night in an effort to
save his life.

Several hours after Miss Jayne was
taken in custody, it was discovered that
her leg had been fractured in the fight-
ing which occurred at her apartment
before the shooting. She was removed
to Bellevue hospital.

The district attorney's office an-
nounced that while Miss Jayne did not
admit the shooting, she said she and
Yates fought because he insisted she
move to a cheaper apartment.
