**Sound Fades Away**  
 For two hours more the cruising  
 flights of his plane circled the airport.  
 Then the sound of his motor faded  
 away. Two more hours passed and the  
 lights had not been seen. Pilots Bill  
 Butters and Dale Dryer climbed into  
 their planes at daybreak. Two miles  
 away they saw the wreckage of a plane  
 wrapped around the trunk of a tree.  
 Twenty-five feet away lay Reid's body.  
 One of his fuel tanks was full.  
 "He was asleep," Dryer said. "He  
 came down in a dive, dead to the world  
 right after leaving the airport."

Reid will not be credited with break-  
 ing the world's solo flight record as  
 rules of the American Aeronautical as-  
 sociation require that a flyer land at  
 the same time from which he took off.

## ROBERT PARRETT RECEIVES PAROLE

A telephone message received late  
 this morning by Stuart T. Fisher from  
 John M. Parrett, at Indianapolis, stated  
 that Robert Parrett had been paroled  
 from the Michigan City state prison.

The parole is understood to have be-  
 come effective this morning. Mr. Par-  
 rett and his son will arrive home prob-  
 ably tonight or early tomorrow morn-  
 ing.

 received, an Associated Press dispatch  
 to The Clarion-News contained addi-  
 tional facts. The Parrett parole was  
 the only one granted today. The board  
 of trustees of the Indiana state prison  
 commuted Parrett's sentence from five

### Parade Starts at 10:15

The big parade will move at 10:15
