

LABOR DAY WILL BE CELEBRATED IN GREAT STYLE

GREAT PARADE TO PASS THROUGH CITY MONDAY MORNING—NOTABLE SPEAKERS, VARIED ENTERTAINMENT AT FAIRGROUNDS

Union labor and Farm Bureau organizations south of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad will unite Monday in a monster gathering in Princeton and at the fairgrounds.

The day's exercises will be held at the Gibson county fairgrounds following a great parade through the city, details of which are given in other columns.

Business will suspend in Princeton for the day. Immense crowds are expected in the city for the occasion.

Exercises at Grounds

Immediately following the parade Mayor William S. Ennes will deliver the address of welcome from the bandstand in the fairgrounds amphitheater.

Kate Richard O'Hare, a noted speaker, will follow with an address.

The male quartet, composed of Indianapolis singers, will give numbers and at 1:45 o'clock President William H. Settle of the Indiana Farm Bureau will speak.

At 2 o'clock there will be a short address by T. N. Taylor, president of the Indiana Federation of Labor. He will be followed by Powers Hapgood, a Harvard graduate, who has mined coal in every mining state in the union and in every coal mining country in the world. He is 30 years of age.

The male quartet will again sing and a band concert will follow.

At 4 o'clock there will be a Charleston contest.

There will be more selections by the band and at 6 o'clock a balloon ascension and parachute leaps.

At 7 o'clock the quartet will sing and there will be tree acts.

At 8 o'clock there will be a grand display of fireworks.

The program will conclude at 8:30 o'clock with boxing contests between Jimmy Hitch and Adrian Webster, Princeton lightweights, and Indianapolis and Chicago boxers, to be followed by a battle royal between colored entrants.

A feature of the day will be the clowns who will take part in the parade and will also appear at the fairgrounds during the day.

Business houses and residents of the city are asked to display their flags Monday.

NOTES

The Judges' stand for the parade will be on the north side of the courthouse lawn. Arriving at the fairgrounds the floats will pass around the track and will be reviewed a second time by the judges from the judges' stand.

The parade will start promptly at 10 a. m.

GERMANY TO GET FIRST RANK SEAT

FRANCE AND POLAND WIN VICTORY AT SESSION OF LEAGUE

GENEVA, Sept. 4.—(P)—The League of Nations council today adopted the report of the commission on reorganization of the council, providing for the creation of three new non-permanent council seats and designating Germany as a permanent seat holder as soon as she is elected to league membership.

Passage of the commission's report in favor of creating three non-permanent seats along with its recommendation that Germany alone should be given a permanent chair constituted a victory for France and her ally, Poland but was not obtained without difficulty.

ESCAPES ONE; SECOND WRECK MAY BE FATAL

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Sept. 4.—(P)—Mrs. D. A. Schnobel escaped injury last night when an automobile crashed into her car, completely wrecking it. Later a street car crashed into the wreck and hurled a portion of it against the woman, probably fatally injuring her. She is in a hospital with a fractured skull.

FIND 15 BODIES IN WRECKED MINE

RESCUE WORKERS WILL CONTINUE TO SEEK BODY OF LAST VICTIM

TAHONA, Okla., Sept. 4.—(P)—Fifteen bodies, all badly burned, some almost beyond recognition, have been brought to the surface here today from the Superior Smokeless Coal mine No. 29, where an explosion yesterday snuffed out the lives of sixteen men.

The sixteen bodies were buried beneath debris. Rescue workers said they would not stop until the last body was recovered.

TAHONA, Okla., Sept. 4.—(P)—Rescue workers at noon today continued attempts to recover nine or ten bodies from the debris of Superior Smokeless Coal company mine, No. 29, which was wrecked by an explosion Friday.

Seven bodies have been removed from the mine and others have been recovered but not brought to the surface.

Gas hampered workers throughout the day although fire raged in the mine Friday was extinguished last night. Sixteen men were believed to have been killed by the blast. No hope of finding any of the other entombed alive remained at noon today.
