

LET ON MONDAY DAY OF CELEBRATION

HOSTS OF LABOR TO OBSERVE THEIR DAY WITH RALLY

MANY MARCHERS EXPECTED IN THE MORNING PARADE

Barbecue, Sports and Speeches Will Be Features at the Fair Grounds—Everybody Invited to Attend the Celebration—Several Thousand are to be in Line in Parade

For the first time in a number of years Princeton will observe Labor Day with a big celebration, under the auspices of the Central Labor Union.

At 9:30 Monday morning the big parade will move, with large representation of every union in the city in line, it is expected, and there will also be a number of floats and other features. Prizes are offered for the best showing among the unions. The parade promises to be one of the largest and best ever seen in Princeton.

The line of march will be as follows, a slight change from the route first announced:

Form in south Hart street and on either side therefrom in Water street, moving north on Hart to Broadway, west to West street, north to State street, east to Hart, south on Hart to Broadway, east on Broadway to Main, north on Main to State, west to Hart, north on Hart to Spruce, and west on Spruce to Embree and to the fair grounds. M. Woods is chief marshal and George Gayor assistant chief marshal.

At the fair grounds there will be a barbecue, sports and speeches during the morning and early afternoon, and the day promises to be a big one. Several bands may be in the parade and there will be plenty of music. Everybody is invited to attend.

Business generally will be suspended in Princeton practically all of Monday on account of it being a holiday.
