BIG LABOR DAY CELEBRATION
 WILL BE HELD IN PRINCETON

Locals Get Better End of Score of 5
 to 3 in a Game Devoid of
 Sensationalism

Parade Promises to Be a Head-Liner
 for Princeton—The March and
 the Formation Outlined

In a game cleanly played but devoid of any special features the locals defeated the Mt. Carmel team Sunday by the score of 5 to 3. But for one bobble of Budke's at second the Champs would have had a clean slate in the error column. The three errors of the visitors did not contribute so much to the score as did Johnson's two wild pitches and his four presents to Princeton batters. The locals only made six hits off of Johnson, two in each of the first three innings, but these hits were timely. The Owensville boy was wild during the earlier part of the game, but settled down and in the last half of the game pitched in old time form.

One week from today is expected to be a big day for Princeton. It will be Labor Day, and a big celebration is to be held under the auspices of the Central Labor Union.

Committees are busy getting everything lined up, and it is expected some definite announcements of arrangements, program and speakers may be made after a meeting of the C. L. U. and committees tonight.

The Formation

The parade formation and line of march have been announced and will be as follows:
