## CITY SCHOOLS TO OPEN ON SEPT. 8

STUDENTS URGED TO REPORT ON  
OPENING DAY SO AS TO GET  
RIGHT START

The usual amount of maintenance and repair work has been made upon the various city school buildings and all is in readiness for the opening of schools Tuesday morning, September 8.

Principals, superiyrsors and teachers' meetings will be held on Monday, September 7. The principals and supervisors meet at 8 o'clock. A general teachers' meeting will be held at 9 o'clock, after which building meetings will be held at an hour agreed upon by principal and teachers of each building respectively.

### Children Report Tuesday

All children of the elementary schools and of the Lincoln high school report Tuesday morning at 8:30 o'clock. They will enroll, receive book lists and be dismissed until Wednesday morning. It is essential for the good progress of the children that they enroll the first day and equip themselves with the proper books and supplies in order that the work may commence at once. The hours for Princeton high school are as follows: Sophomores and freshmen who entered last mid-year, at 8:30 o'clock; juniors at 10 o'clock; seniors and post-graduates at 11 o'clock; entering 9B freshmen at 1 o'clock.

Considerable inconvenience to pupils and teachers will be avoided if students will observe these hours. It is important that all report on Tuesday and get books on or before Tuesday so that all may be ready to begin school regularly on Wednesday. JUDGE ANNOUNCES CHARGES  
AGAINST POWERS TO BE TAK-  
EN UP NOVEMBER 10

Meanwhile Digging Near Home Con-  
tinues in Search for More of  
His Victims

CLARKSBURG, W. Va., Sept. 1.—

(AP)—While authorities renewed the search to determine whether there were more bodies buried on the Quiet Dell "murder farm" Harry E. Powers is alleged to have operated here, Judge John E. Southern announced today there would be no special session of the grand jury to hear charges against Powers.

After two days of fruitless digging around Powers' garage near where the bodies of Mrs. Asta Elcher, Chicago; Mrs. D. P. Lemke, Worcester, Mass., and Mrs. Elcher's three children, were found, workmen again were directed to probe in an old well near the garage. Officers believed yesterday they had reached the bottom of the well but residents of the district told them it was originally more than 12 feet deep, the depth they reached in the first examination.

### At Regular Session

Judge Southern announced Powers' case would be laid before the regular session of the grand jury when circuit court convenes November 10. More precautions were taken to guard Powers in the county jail.

The authorities, meanwhile, were tracing more reports that Powers had been seen in the vicinity of Quiet Dell with women. Mrs. Charles Dye, a farmer's wife living about a mile from Powers' garage, said she saw Powers near the building often and that he kept his face hidden.

The man had corresponded with scores of women in various parts of the county, and of the county in tracing these to determine whether any of them are missing. Authorities say Powers admitted he lured Mrs. Elcher and Mrs. Lemke to Clarksburg through his correspondence.
