**CHARLES FOX SPEAKS AT EVANSVILLE MEET**

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Sept. 4.—Labor day was celebrated in Evansville and many of the other "pocket" towns on an elaborate scale. All public buildings were closed and stores and factories generally were closed for the day in this city. The program was carried out at Mesker park where an all-day celebration was held. Delegations came here from many of the towns and cities in southern Indiana. Henderson, Ky., joined hands with the Central Labor Union of Evansville in the celebration here and sent a large delegation of workmen and their families. A parade was held in the morning. The speaking at the park in the afternoon attracted a large crowd. The speakers were Charles Fox, of Indianapolis, member of the Indiana Industrial board and former president of the Indiana State Federation of Labor; Thomas Hudson, of Brazil, vice-president of the Brick and Clay Workers of America, and Lonnie Jackson, of Central City, Ky., president of the United Mine Workers in District 23. Games and contests were held at the park following the speeches. Of the sixty-five local labor unions practically all were represented in the celebration.

**BUS LINE TO MT VERNON**

**MISSIONARIES BELIEVED SAVED**  
 Convention Was Being Held 150 Miles From Scene

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 4.—Several hundred missionaries in Japan were attending an inter-denominational convention at Kariowaka at the time of the earthquake. It was announced here today by the southern Presbyterian board. The meeting place is 150 miles from Tokio. All of the missionaries in Tokio and Yokohama were believed at the meeting and probably escaped the disasters in those cities.

**AMERICANS RUSH RELIEF**  
 Asiatic Fleet Commander Speeds To Tokio With Aid

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—Speed and effectiveness with which American naval units are being concentrated for the relief of Japanese disaster victims are shown in dispatches to the navy department today from Admiral Anderson, commander of the Asiatic fleet. Anderson notified the department that he is speeding to Yokohama aboard his flagship, the armored cruiser Huron, with all available food and medical supplies. Five other destroyers have been ordered to set out for China with the utmost dispatch for medical relief in Japan. They will proceed as quickly as possible to Yokohama. The commander of this squadron was ordered to obtain from the marine guard at Peking and from the army all available medical supplies and medical personnel.

**COUNTY COUNCIL TAKES UP LEVY**

The county council held its annual meeting at the courthouse today for the purpose of fixing the annual county tax levy for the coming year. The budget submitted by the county officials and institutions was to be gone over and the levy fixed on the expenditures approved. The figures submitted to the council will, if approved, lower the county levy from thirty to twenty seven and one-half cents.
