**SWIMMING RACES
 ON LAKE PROGRAM**

WATER EVENTS IN CONNECTION WITH RED CROSS FINAL INSPECTION.

Ten races for both boys and girls under the age of 16 will be on the program of events for next Friday in connection with Seminole lake, east of the city.

Captain E. M. Carr, field representative of the American Red Cross, will be in the city Friday and Saturday to inspect members of the Junior and Senior life saving corps who have passed the tests this year. The swimming races will be an extra added feature to the water carnival and will be held Friday afternoon starting at 4 o'clock.

Swimming Contests

There will be five races for boys and five for girls, diving contests and an underwater swim. Prizes will be given winners in all events. The prizes will be donated by the local chapter of the Red Cross.

The life saving work and inspection will be resumed at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon and all persons who have not passed the tests this year will be given an opportunity to do so. Captain Carr, assisted by E. Ames Campbell, Red Cross life guard, will review all swimmers who have passed the tests and who hold the life saving certificates.

The program Friday and Saturday will be the closing events of the water season at the lake, sponsored by the Red Cross.
