COMMISSIONER ROBERT G. HAND SUICIDE TODAY

Hand, commissioner of accounts deposits of the treasury department, was found dead in his closed car early today with the motor of automobile running. The body was discovered by a negro shortly after daybreak. A certificate of suicide was issued. Hand, a native of Shubuta, Miss., died principally on estimates of taxes. He had been treated for a nervous disorder and members of the family said he had threatened to take his life by monoxide gas from the motor of his car.

Nobel Prize Winner Soederblom is Dead

SALA, Sweden, July 15. — (AP) — Bishop Nathan Soederblom, successor of Frank B. Kellogg as holder of the Nobel peace prize, died Sunday of a heart attack at the age of 70. Death followed an operation. Soederblom, Lutheran archbishop of Sala and primate of Sweden, received the Nobel prize for 1930 in recognition of his religious work, while former secretary of state was given the prize for 1929. He was the principal organizer of the Christian conference in Stockholm five years ago and had long labored to unite the churches in behalf of universal peace.

IN EFFECT TODAY

With Princeton's new traffic rules operative today, city police began early on the problems that presented themselves.

Busses, in common with other vehicles, must park parallel to the curb and cannot park on the public square if they are longer than 17 feet. As all busses are longer than 17 feet, the effect of the new regulations is to compel them to stop well off the public square as parallel space can seldom be found for a vehicle as long as a bus within a block of the square.

The police warned all motorists and a number of trucks were moved from the square because of their length.

The regulation prohibiting parking on the square longer than an hour has been removed. Parallel parking is forbidden.

Whether the bus companies will unite on a central station or elect to contest the city ruling has not been announced.

Approximately sixteen busses pass through Princeton each day, it is said.
