Testimony of Peach
Herschell Peach, 21, a resident of
Knox county, who was with Wyatt at
the camp meeting grounds, was arrest-
ed at the same time by Miley but af-
terwards was released.

Peach on the stand this morning tes-
tified that Miley had dared him to tes-
tify for the defense. City police said
this morning that Peach came here sev-
eral days ago and asked them if it
would be safe for him to testify this
morning. They told him it would.

Prosecutor Arthur S. Wilson repre-
sented the prosecution. A. Dale Eby
was attorney for the defense.

Marshal Cochren testified that he
was taking Peach and Miley was tak-
ing Wyatt on the way to the lockup.
Cochren testified that he saw Peach
was not intoxicated and that in his
opinion Wyatt was not, either.

The deadly weapon in the case was
a fishknife. Wyatt and Peach had
taken a load of fish to Oakland City.
Miley testified that Wyatt drew a fish-
knife on him but other witnesses tes-
tified that Wyatt did not draw the knife.

Wyatt and Peach testified that they
came on the camp grounds in the eve-
ning. It was dark and they did not see
a sign, "No smoking." Wyatt said he
threw his cigaret down when Miley
"called him" for smoking.

Peach testified that after he was re-
leased he went back to the camp
grounds to get his automobile and that
Miley came up behind him, kicked him
and ordered him off the grounds.

GOVERNORS BACK
PLAN FOR RELIEF

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—(AP)—The
administration's plan for unemploy-
ment relief received approval from
eight state governors as the national
organization selected leaders in Ameri-
can industry to mobilize resources in
local communities to meet the situa-
tion this coming winter.

Commendations of the plan, being
carried out by Walter S. Gifford, na-
tional relief director, were received at
the White House late yesterday from
five governors, while three previously
had signaled their hearty approval.

The chief executives endorsing the
plan were Cross of Connecticut, Bruck-
er of Michigan, Emmerson of Illinois,
Furnell of Arkansas, Conley of West
Virginia, Rolph of California, Whant
of New Hampshire, and Gardiner of
Mississippi. They expressed confidence the
states and cities could care for the
local situations and pledged their co-
operation.
