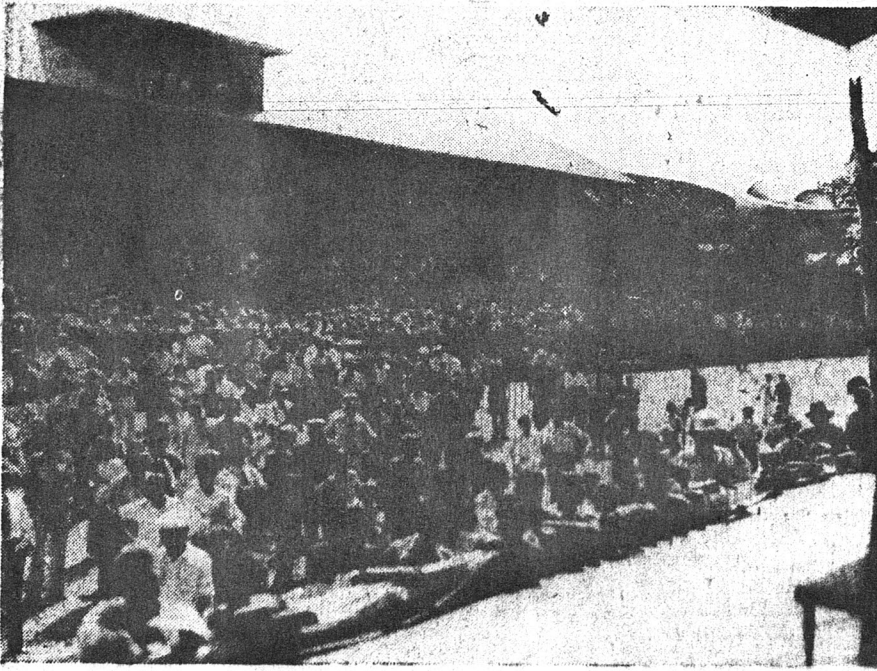
## Appropriation Ordinance Is Adopted By Council

## Watch Race Of Gov. Talmadge, Avowed Foe Of New Deal

(By INS) Political observers, seeking to detect a trend which might be interpreted as a November criterion, looked on with keen interest today as voters of six states made known their choices of public servants at the polls.

The race which attracted most interest was that in Georgia with Governor Eugene Talmadge, outspoken foe of the New Deal, seeking to take the United States senate seat of Senator Richard B. Russell, Jr., supporter of the administration.

South Carolina's balloting resulted in the nomination of G. Hayward Mahone, Democrat, to succeed the late J. J. McSwain, chairman of the house military affairs committee. It was a run-off primary.

Former Superior Judge B. C. Stanford, a Townsendite, held a big lead over Governor B. B. Moeur for the Democratic nomination for governor of Arizona. Thomas E. Campbell was slightly ahead of John Udall, Phoenix mayor, for the Republican nomination.

Governor Ed C. Johnson of Colorado, was well in the van for the Democratic senatorial nomination in his state, leading former Governor W. E. Sweet by more than 7,000 votes.

John C. Stevenson was only slightly behind Governor Clarence D. Martin, Democratic incumbent in the Democratic gubernatorial primary in Washington. The Republican nomination was expected to go to Roland H. Hartley, former governor.

Lieutenant Governor George D. Aiken, 44-year-old farmer, was assured of becoming the next governor of Vermont when he scored a victory over Col. H. Nelson Jackson, in the Republican primary.
