W. B. Robinson, of Vincennes, and Rev. William Strickland led in a further discussion of the two varieties of fruit, in which all the institute took special interest. Mrs. A. L. Smith spoke at length on "Small Fruits," after which the institute adjourned for dinner.

The educational session of the institute held Tuesday evening was one of the most interesting of any during the meeting. The audience was larger, many of the county teachers attending after Dr. Lowden's lecture. The session left everybody feeling that they had been fully repaid for having been present.

"Opportunities for educated Young Men in Agricultural Pursuits" was the subject of an interesting talk by H. F. McMahan, of Liberty, Ind. The speaker was of the opinion that agriculture, when rightly followed, was just as dignified, as full of opportunities for the growth and development of the young man as any other business or profession. He cited many instances to prove that his assertions were true. The discussion of the subject was led by Prof. W. C. Latta, followed by others, and many interesting points were brought out.

Probably one of the most appreciated talks during the institute was that of Miss Laura G. Day, of Wichita, Kansas, who spoke of the "Home and the Home Maker." Miss Day is a fluent speaker and her thoughts were clear, pointed and very practical. All who heard her appreciated her words. The subject was further discussed by Mrs. A. L. Smith and others, Mrs. C. N. Lindley, of Salem, being unable to be present.

During the exercises Tuesday evening delightful solos were rendered by Miss Nellie Young and Mr. E. E. Noble. Miss Gertrude Warnock gave a piano selection in her usual pleasing manner.
