LABOR DAY PLANS

Perfected for the Big Celebration at the Fair Grounds September First

Hon. John W. Brady and Hon. Thomas Duncan Will Be the Speakers—Ball at Night

Arrangements are being made for an excellent labor day celebration here September 1, which will be the opening day of the Gibson county fair and Elks vaudeville. The demonstration will be held at the fair grounds and will be under the auspices of the Central Labor Union.

The speakers for the day are Hon. John W. Brady and Hon. Thomas Duncan, who will speak on subjects of interest to all laboring men. A big industrial parade will be given in the afternoon, and a ball will be given in the I. O. O. F. building in the evening.

Delegations and bands are expected from neighboring points to take part in the demonstration. All local unions will participate. The day will doubtless be one long remembered.

It is desired by the Central Labor Union that all communications concerning the labor day celebration be addressed to the secretary of the committee, William M. Wilson, Princeton.

By a recent action of the board of trustees, the tuition rate of non-resident pupils for all grades below the high school has been fixed at one dollar per month. The tuition rate in the high school remains unchanged and is two dollars per month. Pupils entitled to transfer must be transferred each school year. Transfers are obtained from Township Trustee D.
