Henry Johnson, Hazleton, Succumbs to Dropsy

DELEGATION TO OAKLAND

Band, Federation Members and Miners Spend Day at O. C.

The coal miners formed at the hall at the northeast corner of the square and, headed by the band, marched to the station in a body. They wore badges of the union and carried banners. A big time is expected at the celebration and the Princeton people will doubtless have their share of it.
