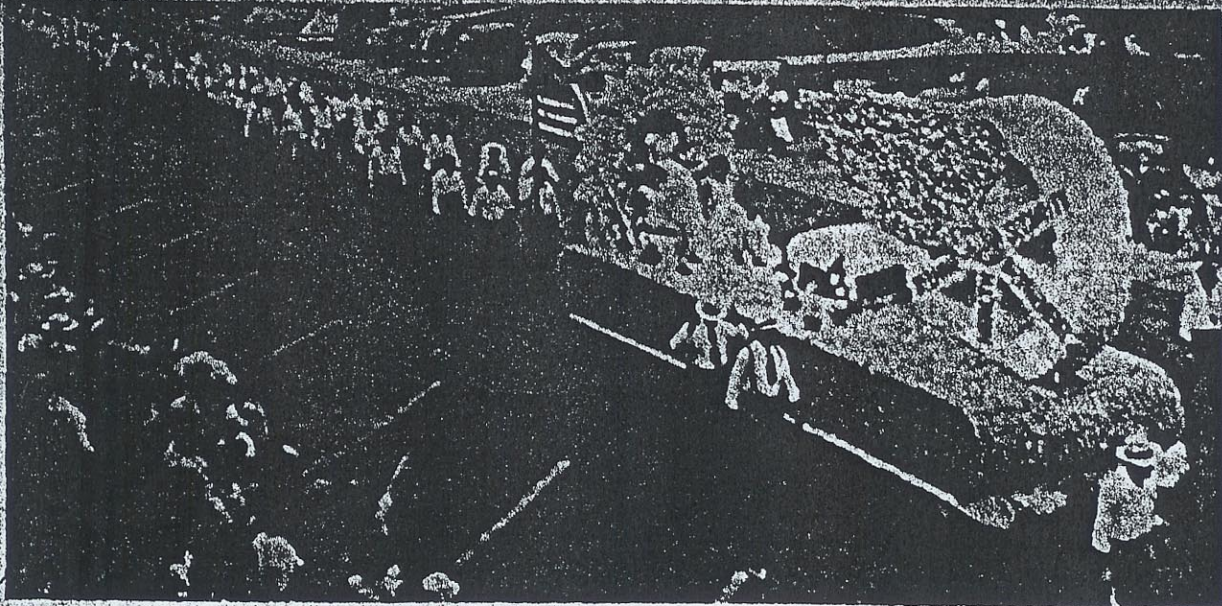


WINNING FLOAT IN PRINCETON PARADE

free for a strong labor movement. Mr. Cooper traced the organization of the U.M.W.A. and endorsed John L. Lewis' efforts in behalf of the welfare and retirement fund for miners. He called upon labor to maintain a strong, clean labor movement.

Mayor Walter Cox extended greetings to the visitors in behalf of the city. Mrs. Thomas Simon, Chandler, sang the National Anthem, opening the program. More than 60 union locals participated in the colorful parade. Also in the line of march were

elaborate floats entered by unions and business firms and 11 musical organizations, including six bands and five drum and bugle corps.

**Kings Float Winner**  
In the union float competition, Kings local 2384 won first prize of \$100. The Ingle Coal corporation, Ditney Hill mine local 7693, was awarded second prize of \$50, and Winslow local 1336, third, \$25.

Princeton Moose lodge No. 354 won first prize of \$60 in the non-union float competition. The float of the Salvation Army, Princeton and Evansville corps, won second prize of \$40.

Sunlight local 3437, Boonville, won first place and the \$50 award for mine locals with an attendance of more than 100 men.

Cedar Valley local 7741 won the \$50 award for locals with less than 100 in attendance on general parade display, and \$50 for attendance.

Prizes for the best dressed un-

formed locals were given as follows: Enos local 5179, \$100, Sunlight local, \$50, and Ditney Hill local, \$25.

The Enos local won the miners' loving cup for parade attendance and display.

Concerts were presented throughout the day by the Princeton, Boonville and Oakland City high school bands. Music also was provided by Kitchen band of Indianapolis Moose lodge No. 17 with comedians and entertainers. The Kay Kaiser revue presented

free acts this afternoon preceding a horse show. An elaborate program of free acts closed the program tonight.

The Labor Day association entertained 200 persons, including labor officials and guests, at a dinner at noon at the Broadway Christian church. The meal was prepared by the women of the church.
