

# Local Unions Celebrate Monday

**Mammoth Crowd Expected to Attend All Day Celebration; No Charge Will Be Made for Entrance to Riverside Park or Grand Stand.**

Historic Vincennes, the city that was host to the nation's Chief Executive last year, will throw open its gates Monday for the annual Labor Day celebration and organized labor of southern Indiana, will converge on the capitol city of the Northwest Territory to spend the day on which they would ordinarily be swinging pick and shovel, in having a good time, free from the worries of their occupation.

Vincennes, with its beautiful scenery, spacious streets and the Clark Memorial, seems a fitting place for the occasion. It has found its name in scores of history books, for it was here George Rogers Clark, fearless colonial leader, decided whether we were to remain under British rule or be a part of the struggling young republic. He marched for days through icy water and sharp vines and thickets to capture the city and break the grip of John Bull in the Northwest, and earned undying gratitude from us who live here now.

Starting with the mammoth parade of labor unions and floats of the various concerns in the city and from other places as well, at 10 o'clock a. m., the celebration will last the entire day. Some of America's foremost speakers will deliver addresses, the Belmonts Revue will perform on the free act stage, and a balloon ascension is scheduled to take place. At 2 o'clock, a sacred band concert will be given and the Rev. Paul Maurer is to deliver the sermon.

No charge will be made for admittance to Vincennes' Riverside Park, nor will there be any charge for seat in the grandstand. On the grounds there will be a carnival with various rides and concessions. These many attractions and the town itself should prove to you that Vincennes is the place to spend your Labor Day vacation.
